President's Report – 2025

In 2025, the TJF Board of Directors consisted of Rosemary Gibb (President), Liz (Secretary), and Dave Gibb (Treasurer). Directors at Large were Danielle Parenteau, Helen Barkley, Mary Martineau, and Helen Shaw. Thank you to Mark Cuddy for completing his two 3 year terms as Secretary, and we welcome Liz Harper to that position. The President for 2026 will be Helen Barkley, as Rosemary will have completed her two 3 year terms at the end of 2025.

Of the 22 funding applications received in 2025, TJF provided a total of \$21,000, distributed among four programs. Since its inception in 2000, TJF has made 77 funding awards totalling \$360,710.

1. We have provided funding to TEMBO (Tanzania Education and Micro-Business Opportunity) for the past five years and for several years before that. For 21 years TEMBO has been supporting secondary school education for girls, and micro-business opportunities for women in Northern Tanzania, in the rain shadow of Mount Kilimanjaro. Arlene McKechnie, a former vice-president of TEMBO and continuing Board member, spoke at Trinity's April 6, TJF service, describing the work being done in Tanzania to enable girls to receive an education. TEMBO was awarded \$6000.

2. Rayjon Share Care submitted a funding request for their Pinson Community Garden Project in Haiti. The Pinson community faces chronic food insecurity. It is hoped that the Garden Project will provide fresh, nutritious food for families, hands-on training in sustainable agriculture, and serve as a gathering space to foster collaboration and pride. The Pinson Community Garden Project was awarded \$6000.

3. For over 40 years now, Acts for Water has been partnering with Ugandan communities, providing access to clean water, latrines, imperative hygiene and sanitation education, and entrepreneurial training to improve the lives of local Ugandan people so that they can achieve better health, higher education levels, and an improved economy. TJF is pleased to award them \$6000 this year.

4. Project Hope operates out of the Helping Hands Street Mission in Hamilton. It is different from the charities we usually fund. The Mission is open on Friday nights from 1am to 6 am. It provides a safe and welcoming place for women who are out on the street at night time, to receive access to resources such as food, drinks, hygiene supplies, a place to rest and connect with friends who care. We will assess over the coming year the suitability of this charity for TJF funding by requesting regular updates from them. Project Hope was awarded \$3000.

On behalf of the TJF Board, I thank the Trinity congregation for its continuing interest in, and support of programs that provide tireless help to so many people in need.
